A Note from our Landscape Maintenance Manager -Kim Boyle

Spring Plant Care

- In spring, preferably mid to late March, apply a Pre-Emergent, such as Preen (Treflan), to all mulch beds. This will help stop weed germination. Reapply late June.
- Boxwoods were hit hard this winter. Experts are saying to take a "wait and see" approach.
- Cut back all grasses to about 6 inches in early March. It helps to use electric or power hedge trimmers on the larger grasses. Some grasses will benefit from a quick burn of the stubble foliage.
- Cut back roses to 12" and fertilize them with rose food & systemic insecticide.
- Do not prune lilacs, forsythia, and other spring-blooming shrubs until after they bloom.
