News from the Maintenance Crew

Kim & Mike attended a seminar presenting the latest techniques and technology on paver maintenance, cleaning, and sealing.

This year you will be seeing a new face on the maintenance team. Colton Estey will be starting as foreman for the team.

We want to give you a few tips on pruning Hydrangeas. (Right species, right time)

Late Fall/Early Spring:

Smooth (Annabelle) and Panicle (Limelight) - Dead head blooms and remove dead, criss cross branching.

After Summer blooming:

-Oakleaf ('Ruby Slippers') - Remove spent blooms and size control

-Bigleaf ('Endless Summer') and Mountain ('Bluebird') - Dead head blooms in late summer and remove dead branches in Late Spring

-Climbing ('Firefly') - Limited pruning needed

For those of you that have gravel debris from snow removal, we have the equipment and expertise to effectively and efficiently clean the rocks out of the grass and restore the damaged turf areas. Give our maintenance team a call.

Due to the extreme weather this winter, we are expecting some plant damage. Plants may or may not exhibit damage right away; it may be several months down the road. We'll just have to wait and see.
